It defines some important terms like "predestination" and also provides a helpful look at how the church has viewed God's role in salvation throughout history. Finally, this introduction establishes some important ground rules that will guide you through the entire series.

CALVINISM

the group of Christian doctrines of John Calvin and his followers, esp. those of predestination and the salvation of the elect solely by God's grace

Predestination

Pre - before hand

Destiny - the place we are going; a destination

What predestination means, in its most elementary form, is that as believers, our final destination is decided by God.

A QUICK HISTORY LESSON

Considerable discussion had arisen in the Netherlands at the beginning of the 17th century concerning the understanding of divine sovereignty. This centered for a period in the teaching of Jacob Arminius (1560-1609), a Dutch seminary professor. New Dictionary of Theology

Remonstrance Document

- a God's election is based on foresight of man's faith.
- b The intent of Christ's death was the salvation of all human beings.
- Fallen man is incapable of any good without the intervention of the Holy Spirit.
- Saving grace may be resisted.
- Whether the truly regenerated can lose their salvation requires more study.

Arminianism made man's salvation dependent ultimately on man himself, saving faith being viewed throughout as man's own work. J.I. Packer

Synod of Dort (1618)

- a Purpose: examine the "five points" of the Remonstrance
- Compare them with Scripture
- c Considered them incompatible with Scripture
- Consequently rejected the teaching

No doubt it will seem strange to many in our day that the Synod of Dort rejected as heretical the five doctrines advanced by the Arminians, for these doctrines have gained wide acceptance in the modern Church. In fact, they are seldom questioned in our generation. Salvation was viewed by the members of the Synod as a work of grace from beginning to end; in no sense did they believe that the sinner saved himself or contributed to his salvation. The ability

of fallen man to believe the gospel was itself a gift from God, bestowed only upon those whom He had chosen to be the objects of HIS unmerited favor. It was not man, but God who determined which sinners would be shown mercy and saved. This, in essence, is what the members of the Synod of Dort understood the Bible to teach. David Steele & Curtis Thomas

- Rejection not enough
- Issued a response "Five Points of Calvinism"

FIVE POINTS OF CALVINISM

1 Fallen man, on his own, cannot believe the gospel.

"No one can come to Me unless the Father who sent Me draws him; and I will raise him up at the last day." John 6:44

2 God's choice of a sinner is the cause of salvation.

And He said, "Therefore I have said to you that no one can come to Me unless it has been granted to him by My Father." John 6:65

Christ's death actually saved His people.

"I am the Good Shepherd. The Good Shepherd gives His life for the sheep." John 10:11

"All that the Father gives Me will come to Me, and the one who comes to Me I will by no means cast out." John 6:37

Those chosen by God, redeemed by Christ and given faith by the Spirit are forever saved.

"My sheep hear My voice, and I know them, and they follow Me. And I give them eternal life, and they shall never perish; neither shall anyone snatch them out of MY hand." John 10:27-28

A proper discussion of salvation centers on God, not on man. The primary goal of redemption is the manifestation of the glory of God. God's glory is manifested even in the punishment of the wicked.

TOTAL INABILITY

As a result of Adam's sin, all mankind is spiritually dead, unable to either comprehend or believe spiritual truths. Man is blind and deaf to the message of salvation.

It just so happens your friend here is just mostly dead. There's a big difference between mostly dead and all dead... Mostly dead is slightly alive. All dead, well with all dead there's usually only one thing you can do... go 'through his clothes and look for loose change. Miracle Man Max

The Warning

WHAT DOES A DEAD MAN NEED?

LIFE

Jesus answered, "Most assuredly, I say to you, unless one is born of water and the Spirit, he cannot enter the kingdom of God. 6"That which is born of the flesh is flesh, and that which is born of the Spirit is spirit. 7"Do not marvel that I said to you, 'You must be born again.' John 3:5-7

Can he do this on his own power?

Does natural (fallen) man have the ability to "come to CHRIST"?

Can a natural (fallen) man understand "spiritual things"? NO

Is the gospel a"spiritual thing"? YES

Therefore, can a natural (fallen) man understand the gospel? NO

Does natural (fallen) man have the ability to "come to Christ"?

This deals with ABILITY, not permission.

PERMISSION

"For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life. John 3:16

ABILITY

unless -- necessary condition, this must happen before something else can happen

draw -- Greek word is "elko" which means "to compel" Kittel's Theological Dictionary

But you have dishonored the poor man. Is it not the rich who oppose you and personally drag you into court. James 2:6

Can fallen (natural) man do anything that is spiritually profitable? NO

Does natural (fallen) man have the ability to "come to Christ"? NO

Don't I have free will?

Free will is the ability to make choices without any prior prejudice, inclination, or disposition. NO!

Free will without God's grace is not free will at all, but is the permanent prisoner and bondslave of evil, since it cannot turn itself to good. Martin Luther

The will always chooses according to its strongest inclination at the moment. Jonathan Edwards

How can a dead man change (be born again)?

Does this change require the intervention of an "outside" force?

If so, does God work with equal saving power in every person's life?

Since God choose some for salvation, must He choose all?

1 Read 1 Corinthians 2:14. Based on this verse, do you think a person who rejects Christ does so because he can't make sense of the gospel message or because the gospel message seems too foolish to accept? Explain your reasoning.

2 In your own words, how would you explain the difference between having permission to come to Christ and having the ability to come to Christ?

3 If God has to draw (or drag) a person to Himself (John 6:44), does that mean that the person does not want to come to Christ at the point of conversion? Why or why not?

4 Think back to your life before Christ. In what ways was your will in bondage, preventing you from truly exercising free will?

5 Read Romans 10:9-17. What has the power to give faith to people who are spiritually dead? What should you do to help spiritually dead people embrace Christ?

Think of a person in your life who is not currently a follower of Christ. Does the truth that he or she is spiritually dead mean that there is no hope for the person to come to Christ? Why or why not?

The fourth message of this series deals with a word that all Christians have to either accept or cut out of their Bibles: election. We'll see that God has already chosen those who will be saved, and that He did it in spite of the sinfulness of those He would save. Our understanding of God will grow as we consider that we love Him because He first loved us.

UNCONDITIONAL ELECTION

God chose to save certain individuals. That choice was based on nothing within these people but rested solely on God's good pleasure.

Every Christian believes in election. They believe either...

Man Chooses God OR God Chooses Man

The Bible Teaches... GOD SAVES SINNERS

GOD... The Trinity, Father, Son and Holy Spirit working together.

SAVES... Does everything, first to last, to bring man to glory.

SINNERS... People guilty before God, helpless, powerless, unable to do God's will.

After the fall and mankind's death in Adam, man simply could not save himself. And so...

God could save none.

God could save all.

God could save some.

God is Sovereign in Salvation

Sovereign... Above or superior to all others; supreme in power and rank; independent of all others

He would do as He pleased.

He needed no one's permission.

He was under no obligation to save anyone.

He would be perfectly just in choosing any of the 3 options.

He could choose to save some without obligation to save others.

UNCONDITIONAL ELECTION

God chose to save certain individuals. That choice was based on nothing within these people but rested solely on God's good pleasure.

What the Bible says about election...

God did the choosing

...knowing, beloved brethren, your election by God. 1 Thessalonians 1:4

But we should always give thanks to God for you, brethren beloved by the Lord, because God has chosen you from the beginning for salvation...

2 Thessalonians 2:13

God's choice was made before the world's creation

...just as He chose us in Him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and blameless before Him. Ephesians 1:4

God's choice was not based on merit within the elect

...who has saved us, and called us with a holy calling, not according to our works, but according to His own purpose and grace... 2 Timothy 1:9

...for the children not yet being born, nor having done any good or evil, that the purpose of God according to election might stand, not of works but of Him who calls... Romans 9:11

God's choice was not based on man's foreseen faith

So then it does not depend on the man who wills or the man who runs, but on God who has mercy. Romans 9:16

...as many as had been appointed to eternal life believed. Acts 13:48

And a certain woman named Lydia, from the city of Thyatira, a seller of purple fabrics, a worshiper of God, was listening; and the Lord opened her heart to respond to the things spoken by Paul. Acts 16:14

For to you it has been granted for Christ's sake, not only to believe in Him, but also to suffer for His sake... Philippians 1:29

God's choice was based on His sovereign mercy

But when the kindness and the love of God our Savior toward man appeared, not by works of righteousness which we have done, but according to His mercy He saved us, through the washing of regeneration and renewing of the Holy Spirit... Titus 3:4-5

And not only this, but there was Rebekah also, when she had conceived twins by one man, our father Isaac; 11 for though the twins were not yet born, and had not done anything good or bad, in order that God's purpose according to His choice might stand, not because of works, but because of Him who calls, 12it was said to her, "The older will serve the younger." 13 Just as it is written, "Jacob I loved, but Esau I hated." ¹⁴What shall we say then? There is no injustice with God, is there? May it never be! 15For He says to Moses, "I will have mercy on whom I have mercy, and I will have compassion on whom I have compassion." ¹⁶So then it does not depend on the man who wills or the man who runs, but on God who has mercy. ¹⁷For the Scripture says to Pharaoh, "For this very purpose I raised you up, to demonstrate My power in you, and that My Name might be proclaimed throughout the whole earth." 18So then He has mercy on whom He desires, and He hardens whom He desires. 19You will say to me then, "Why does He still find fault? For who resists His will?" 20On the contrary, who are you, O man, who answers back to God? The thing molded will not say to the molder, "Why did you make me like this," will it? 21 Or does not the potter have a right over the clay, to make from the same lump one vessel for honorable use, and another for common use? ²²What if God, although willing to demonstrate His wrath and to make His power known, endured with

much patience vessels of wrath prepared for destruction? ²³And He did so in order that He might make known the riches of His glory upon vessels of mercy, which He prepared beforehand for glory, ²⁴even us, whom He also called, not from among Jews only, but also from among Gentiles. Romans 9:10-24

1 Why is it fair for God to choose some people to be saved, but not every single person?

2 Why should those who are chosen have a sense of humility rather than pride?

3 Someone might say, "OK, I see that God has chosen me before the foundation of the world, but I really did make a choice to follow God." How would you help reconcile this apparent tension?

4 Suppose that you share the gospel with a person who is far from God and they don't respond with faith. Would it be right to conclude that they must not be chosen by God for salvation? Why or why not?

5 It is said that Charles Spurgeon, a tremendous 19th century preacher, once said, "If God would have painted a yellow stripe on the backs of the elect I would go around lifting shirts (and preaching to them). But since He didn't, I must preach 'whosoever will,' and when 'whosoever' believes, I know he is one of the elect." What comes to mind when you read that quote?

5 Limited Atonement



The fifth message of this series answers the questions, "For whom did Christ die?" and "What did Christ actually achieve on the cross for those for whom He died?" We'll see that Christ's death on the cross was powerful and effective to save God's people. As we understand the nature of Christ's atonement, we'll see that, on the cross, Jesus was the perfect substitute who paid the penalty for His people's sin.

Several terms we may use...

Limited Atonement

Definite Atonement

Particular Redemption

The questions we ask:

For whom did Christ die?

What did Jesus accomplish by His death?

Did Jesus' death merely make salvation possible for everyone, because He died for all, without actually saving anyone?

Or did His death actually save someone?

FOR WHOM DID CHRIST DIE?

Today most Christians would answer, "Why, for the whole world of course!" I believe the Bible teaches Christ died for the elect, for the elect alone.

We believe the Bible teaches...

Jesus died for His people.

Jesus satisfied the wrath of God toward His people.

Jesus reconciles His people to the Father.

Jesus redeemed His people from bondage.

Jesus covers the guilt and wickedness of His people.

Every Christian believes in limited atonement...

LIMITED BY GOD or LIMITED BY MAN

Christ's redeeming work was definite in design and accomplishment -- it was intended to render complete satisfaction for certain specified sinners and it actually secured salvation for these individuals and no one else. All for whom Christ sacrificed Himself will be saved. Redemption, therefore, was designed to bring to pass God's purpose of election. David Steele & Curtis Thomas

Christ's obedience and suffering were of infinite value, and if God had so willed, the satisfaction rendered by Christ would have saved every member of the human race. But He came into the world to represent and save only those given to Him by the Father. David Steele & Curtis Thomas

Every Christian believes in limited atonement...

LIMITED BY GOD or LIMITED BY MAN



"Who gave Himself for us to redeem us." Titus 2:14

And we have seen and testify that the Father has sent the Son as Savior of the world. I John 4:14

For I think that God has displayed us, the apostles, last, as men condemned to death; for we have been made a spectacle to the world. I Corinthians 4:9

And many of the Samaritans of that city believed in Him because of the word of the woman who testified, "He told me all that I ever did." 40So when the Samaritans had come to Him, they urged Him to stay with them; and He stayed there two days.

⁴¹And many more believed because of His own word. 42Then they said to the woman, "Now we believe, not because of what you said, for we ourselves have heard Him and we know that this is indeed the Christ, the Savior of the world." John 4:39-42



THE CHAIN OF SALVATION

...and whom He predestined, these He also called; and whom He called, these He also justified; and whom He justified, these He also glorified. Romans 8:30 (NASB)

> ...to all who are beloved of God in Rome, called as saints: Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. Romans 1:7

> Therefore do not be ashamed of the testimony of our Lord, or of me His prisoner; but join with me in suffering for the gospel according to the power of God, 9who has saved us, and called us with a holy calling, not according to our works, but according to His own purpose and grace which was granted us in Christ Jesus from all eternity. 2 Timothy 1:8-9

> This calling is not a general invitation to sinners to believe the gospel and be saved (as in Matthew 20:16), but refers to God's effectual call of the elect to salvation. This calling results in holiness, imputed (justification) and imparted (sanctification), and finally completed (glorification). John MacArthur

And you were dead in your trespasses and sins... 4But God, being rich in mercy, because of His great love with which He loved us, ⁵even when we were dead in our transgressions, made us alive together with Christ (by grace you have been saved)... Ephesians 2:1; 4-5

For by grace you have been saved through faith; and that not of yourselves, it is the gift of God; 9not as a result of works, that no one should boast. Ephesians 2:8-9

For we also once were foolish ourselves, disobedient, deceived, enslaved to various lusts and pleasures, spending our life in malice and envy, hateful, hating one another. ⁴But when the kindness of God our Savior and His love for mankind appeared, ⁵He saved us, not on the basis of deeds which we have done in righteousness, but according to His mercy, by the washing of regeneration and renewing by the Holy Spirit... IS IT TRUE?

Natural man does not understand any spiritual thing including the gospel.

> But a natural man does not accept the things of the Spirit of God; for they are foolishness to him, and he cannot understand them, because they are spiritually appraised. 1 Corinthians 2:14

> And you He made alive, who were dead in trespasses and sins. Ephesians 2:1

> "There is none righteous, not even one; 11there is none who understands, there is none who seeks for God; 12 all have turned aside, together they have become useless; there is none who does good, there is not even one." Romans 3:10-12

Creates arrogance in a believer.

SO WHAT?

GOD is magnified

They affirm, again and again, that God is on the throne of the universe; that the sceptre is in His hands; that He is directing all things "after the counsel of His own will". They affirm, not only that God created all things, but also that God is ruling and reigning over all the works of His hands. They affirm that God is the "Almighty", that His will is irreversible, that He is absolute sovereign in every realm of all His vast dominions. And surely it must be so. Only two alternatives are possible: God must either rule, or be ruled; sway or be swayed; accomplish His own will, or be thwarted by His creatures. Accepting the fact that He is the "Most High", vested with perfect wisdom and illimitable power, and the conclusion is irresistible that He must be God in fact, as well as in name. A.W.
