### ELEMENT

## **Control**

### ESSENCE

By retaining authority over your allocation of time, energy and resources, you will progress toward your objectives rather than someone else's.

### EXAMPLE

One would assume that people "up the ladder" are in control. Sadly, it seems that the demands of success are even more pressing than those felt on the way up the curve. In the life of Jesus Christ, there are some dynamite lessons to be learned:

1. Keep your appetites away from the wheel.

2. Insulate yourself from the perfume of public acclaim.

3. Inject into your schedule sufficient time for rest and reflection.

Mark 6:30-31

4. Maintain the right to select your associates.

Mark 5:18-19; Luke 6:12-13

5. Reject any advancement that will assure your decline.

John 6:14-15

6. Avoid all decisions that are argued for image.

John 7:1-11

7. Never allow urgency to upstage importance.

John 11:1-7; 17-21
